The U.S. Census Bureau is gearing up for the 2010 Census - and it needs help to ensure everyone is counted.

The 2010 Census: Employees Making a Difference

Every 10 years, the Census Bureau is required by the U.S. Constitution to count each person residing in the United States - both citizens and non-citizens.

The Census takes a snapshot of the U.S. population, determining how many people reside within the nation's borders, who they are and where they live. Data about how communities are changing are crucial to many planning decisions - such as neighborhood improvements, emergency preparedness and disaster recovery, public health, education, transportation, senior services and much more.

Population data collected through the Census are used to allocate billions of dollars in annual federal funding for states and communities. The census also determines how many seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Census Bureau employees can help ensure their communities are accurately counted and don't miss out on their fair share of funding and political representation.

Short-term 2010 Census jobs are ideal for retirees, college students, recent high school graduates, stay-at-home parents, those seeking a second job to earn extra cash and others seeking part-time work. Those interested in applying for temporary jobs may do so by contacting their Local Census Office, which has begun opening nationwide and will begin hiring in early 2009.

The census is a huge and important task, and it must be done correctly. We are recruiting thousands of applicants to fill temporary census jobs. The Census Bureau is recruiting now. Most selection and hiring will take place beginning in February through May 2009. The census count is used in determining representation in the U.S. House of Representatives, state legislatures, and local governments. It is also used in distributing about \$300 billion in federal funding annually to states and localities for public programs in education, community healthcare, public transportation, housing, and other areas.

Being a Census Taker

As a census taker, you will perform important and valued work. You'll work individually as part of a small team in your own local community. Your work will be supervised by a Crew Leader. You will be expected to visit all the residences in your assigned area to verify address lists. You'll record information on a small, hand held computing device, which will transmit the data via wireless communications. In most cases, you will need a vehicle and valid drivers license to work as a census taker.

If you work in a Local Census Office, you will perform standard office processing work, usually during normal weekday business hours, although some evening or week-end work may be assigned if needed.
